Amalgamation of the recent Consultations in Westfield

Purpose

This paper amalgamates the information in recent public consultations into a single document under the headings outlined in the DCLG Checklist in its document, Lifetime Neighbourhoods.

Three consultations are included: Westfield Questers' Consultation in June 2013, Radstock Youth Partnership Consultation in Spring 2012 and Big Local Community Consultation in October 2013. The Westfield Questers' consultation is the only one of the three which was focusses solely on Westfield.

General

How well does the neighbourhood work as a place to live?

- How will people be able to access the services they require?

Westfield Questers gave the following outline of the views from its consultation:

- Overall, Westfield is a pleasant, safe place to live.
- There are currently good facilities for sport and leisure but these could be built upon and improved.
- Local shops and services are appreciated but some people would like a wider range and choice.
- Despite recent losses of some business and concerns about where future employment will come, from people feel the area does benefit from a range of businesses being based there and through having a mixed economy
- Educational opportunities are good in Westfield with access to schools and the extending college. People appreciate this.
- There has been a number of developments in the area without the infrastructure to support it. This has led to concerns about safety in the area and inappropriate placing of zebra crossings near to roundabouts. Parking is quite a safety issue particularly around schools.
- Having the countryside nearby has meant that people can benefit from this and adds to the feeling that Westfield is a pleasant place to live.

Radstock Youth Partnership gave the following summary:

- That young people in Radstock engage with a range of agencies/ settings, however, there is "drop off" from certain agencies/ settings when YP reach 14/15 & others attract additional YP at 14/15. There also seems to be a gender difference accessing certain agencies/ settings with only 9.5% of young males use Leisure Centres, however, they are used by 26% of young females.
- That "cost" 54.8%, "transport" 51.6% & places being "too far away" 38.7% are important considerations. However, "transport" is more important to young females (41.5% to 56.4%).
- That there are a number of factors that young people say affect their movement within the locality & the accessing of agencies/ settings.
- That a 71.2% of young people "sometimes feel unsafe" in Radstock & the surrounding local areas (76.4% females & 62.3% males).
- That 66 % of young people are particularly concerned about "dark areas/ bad lighting" (75.5% female & 46.2% male) & 35.4% of all surveyed "avoid going out after dark" . 84% of young women "go out with somebody else rather then go alone".
- That young people were keen to engage with a range of activities, however, analysis of the data shows that certain activities are more popular with certain age groups (which should help with promotion, targeting, etc). Likewise, certain activities are more popular by gender, e.g "dance" & "exercise classes".

- That young people were keen to engage with practical workshops, life skills or other activities, but analysis also shows this varies by age group & gender.
- That 68.9% of young people want to be more involved in "having a say about decisions & activities for young people in the area".
- That Writhlington School is very happy to provide access to their young people for discussion, consultation & promotion of activities within the local area.

Big Local Community Questionnaire summarised their findings as follows:

- Facilities for children and young people were highlighted as the most important things to the community, with local and affordable transport coming second and employment and training opportunities third.
- On asking people how the money should be used, and providing a list of seven options, plus an "other" option, the highest score was for improving community facilities, with opportunities for young people coming second and jobs and training a close third.
- There was an opportunity for people to then add any other comments to the
 question about any other ideas in which the money could be used, a variety of
 responses were received, but there were multiple responses for young
 people's projects, more local activities and events for families and thirdly for a
 MacDonald's, cinema, bowling, or somewhere to go.
- From the results of the questionnaire we can gather that the facilities for children and young people, better transport, improving community facilities, jobs and training with more activities for families are the most important issues to people in the Radstock and Westfield area.

Access

How well does the neighbourhood work in terms of enabling residents to get out and about? What about the following groups:

- Older people
- Families with children
- Young adults
- Children
- Disabled people
- Minority ethnic groups

Are there adequate, safe, well maintained pavements/cycle ways and roads?

How will access around the neighbourhood need to change when there is a larger number of older people?

Westfield Questers found that generally access was felt to be good in the area but, as can be seen form later sections, there are some concerns around local infrastructure.

- Good place to live because it has access bath and other major cities
- Good transport links

They found that Road Safety was one of the main areas of concern for residents. There are suggestions in a later section around how to improve this.

- Why are there zebra crossings at junctions?
- School Parking
- Traffic access a problem
- Lots of developments with no improvement in road network
- Parking negative (x4)
- · Residents parking
- Visitors parking on the road
- Long way from motorway
- No lights on cycle path
- Pot-holes in Fosseway Road
- No provision for parking, making it a dangerous situation with parked cars on the road
- Too much traffic need bypass
- School Parking is difficult for residents


Finally, the Westfield Questers found that people appreciate the fact that Westfield residents also have access to the nearby countryside.




Radstock Youth Partnership asked questions about the ease with which young people could access services. They found,

- gender difference accessing certain agencies/ settings with only 9.5% of young males use Leisure Centres, however, they are used by 26% of young females.









The young people commented: "Don't have enough money" "Nope" "Car" "No pavement on road. Just a field around my house" "Unable to find activity that captivates my interest" "I don't" "Getting there" "No" "Activity not available due to waiting lists" "Buses are irregular, 173, 184 & 178 come at irregular times" "Not accessible for people with disabilities" "Can't be bothered to walk" "There aren't any buses in Haydon" "Going into town — expensive" "We only have the 184 in Coleford so going to places after 6pm is not available by public transport" "Can't be bothered" "Dad works shifts & he is the only person in our house who drives therefore if I did any clubs I could only do them every other week & they would be a waste of money" "Access to Peri's" Most appealing things for teenagers are either not frequent enough, such as things like Boom. Schemes aren't appealing to us or the travel option costs too much, this should be improved" "Alleys" "My height sometimes makes people think I'm younger" "Maybe not allowed"

Housing

How well does the range of housing choices that are available in the neighbourhood work for

How well will the housing choices that are available work when there is a larger number of older people?

The Westfield Questers found that not many comments were received around housing

- Good variety of housing
- On the whole good street lighting although needs better maintenance
- Good street lighting
- Council do not maintain exterior decoration

They also found concerns linked to road safety and parking

- Over development- too many new buildings projects and housing developments
- Expansion of Fosseway encroaching onto surrounding area
- Too many houses not enough facilities.

Information, services and amenities

Is there sufficient access to information and advice on housing options, wider services and amenities to exercise choice locally?

How far do residents have local access to services and amenities?

- How far do people have to travel if there is no provision within the neighbourhood?
- How do they get there?

The Westfield Questers found that people felt that Westfield was very well served by local educational establishments.

- College
- Good expansion of Radstock College, more students, more subjects
- Good variety of schools: Junior, special needs and Roman catholic
- Good school facilities (x2)
- Good further education college
- Lucky to have good school and children's centre in Westfield

People seem quite positive about the sport and leisure facilities although, as can be seen from the next section, there are suggestions as to how these facilities can be built upon and improved.

- Good facilities, park and social club
- Good park and shops
- Football field is kept up together.
- Good sports teams and activities for children
- Field is tidy and grass is cut
- Good outside room for sports and for children to play
- Good and plenty of open spaces
- Coffee mornings organised
- Mothers union outreach
- Chapel
- Good play areas for children

People appreciate the local shops and services. If these are not in Westfield then they are available in neighbouring areas. Later comments show how people would like to have a wider range

- Good motor vehicle repair
- · Fire station, police station
- Good surgery
- We have a very nice Butchers also well maintained pretty frontage
- Excellent helpful chemist x2
- Shops are OK, central to many locations
- Go to Midsomer Norton for a day out and Bath and Bristol for shopping
- 4 churches
- Fire station, police station

People appreciate the fact that there are businesses in the area, despite some of the recent losses.

- There are lots of businesses and employment in Westfield
- There is a mixed local economy
- There is a large Business community

Although there were quite a number of sport and leisure facilities listed in the previous section these could obviously be built upon and ensure that all people of all ages and gender are catered for.

- Not enough to do, which encourages drinking
- No concern think it's better than other places
- Not a lot of facilities for young children or sports
- Not enough youth football teams
- Maybe more needed for more activities for girls

- Not enough sports facilities (x3)



Question 1: What two things do you think would most improve our communities?


From the 67 suggestions received, a large number of which were the same suggestions, the top ten of the suggestions were selected and given the percentage and rankings:

- better and improved local shops


Question 2: How should the money be used? (tick your top 3)

There were up to 6 options to tick, as well as the offer of an "other" box. Some respondents ticked three, others ticked more or less than 3. This is an analysis of what was recorded by the respondents themselves.

There were slightly less suggestions received for this question than for the first one, with 65 different suggestions being made, however some of them were made repeatedly. From all of the answers received, we have taken the top ten answers and their rankings.


The Westfield Questers found that people generally felt safe in the area and the low level of crime was supported by police personnel present at the meeting.

- Calm area, no trouble, know everyone, the area is a nice size





Are there parts of Radstock & the surrounding areas where you sometimes feel unsafe?




The Westfield Questers found that, again people seemed positive about the community spirit in the area. There are suggestions later about how this can be built upon.

Thinking about the future

How can we plan now for the changes we are going to see in the coming decades?

- What would be our priorities?

Can we get involved in the design and commissioning of services?

Who is already involved from within our community when we talk to service providers or commissioners?

How can we get wider involvement?

What about the design of the neighbourhood itself?

- Can changes be made to the existing infrastructure?
- How will the infrastructure be maintained?

If a new development is going to take place amongst us or near us, what can be done to make sure it meets the needs of as many people as possible?

- Are there design features we feel are an absolute minimum?
- What type of community infrastructure would be of most benefit to the neighbourhood?

If a change is planned in terms of a service or a design feature in the neighbourhood, will there be winners and/or losers?

- Can this tension be resolved?
- What opposition is there likely to be to any planned changes?

The Westfield Questers stated that, building on existing community spirit and engagement seems to be top of the agenda for many people for the future. Having places to meet and to socialise, whether that is a cafe, a place to eat, a decent pub or a community centre would give people more opportunity to come together.

A community centre in particular would provide the opportunities for increased activity for younger people and perhaps could be combined with providing some of the sporting opportunities, music or showing of films that people would like. There was some suggestion that Westhill Sports and Social Club might be a possibility for a future centre, if it became more of a charitable organisation or there could be a new building among future developments.

The strongest concerns seem to be around the overdevelopment of the area, particularly with regard to how this has affected road safety. This is a strong message for any future developments, that these issues such as parking, where crossings are placed, should receive wider consultation from people that know what works best-the residents.

While appreciating existing sport and leisure facilities people can nevertheless see how these activities could be increased to cater for a wider audience such as more sports activities for girls, more youth football clubs.

In with the green agenda was the request for more cycle paths, car free zones that could be used for play, a green gym, a nature trail. People did appreciate being so near to the countryside.

While Westfield is well served with local shops and services there were concerns about businesses in the area. Westfield does have a number of businesses based

within its boundaries, but people have seen some businesses closing over the last 10 years and this is a concern. Where is the future employment coming from? This is the question raised and one that needs to be kept an eye on, in future developments. There could also be an issues around supporting existing businesses to remain in the area.

This consultation is just the beginning of a process but does give some indication of the areas that are a priority for local people. Hopefully this will also assist Westfield Quester to write their questionnaire and involve the wider community in looking at the issues raised.

The Big Local Trust which is a fund of £1million to spend in the Radstock and Westfield area provides one of the opportunities for the area over the next ten years to look to the future.

Social and Community Life was the main area where people felt that additional facilities would help to improve daily life. It also links to building the community sprit within the area

- Westfield needs a cafe
- Good village pub

- Need a nice place where families can walk to eat
- Lack of community groups. Are young people interested in forming and running them?
